

## TIPS

- » Having your inventory list in Evernote means it will be easy to reference when you're buying supplies for a new project.
- » Keep one or two pictures in the same note as the pattern for easy reference.
- » The more details you include, the better. Remember: you can easily share and update this list!

Craft Ambassador Jenni Lathrop teamed up with knitter Nikki McGonigal ([www.NikkiInStitches.com](http://www.NikkiInStitches.com)) to put together a list of tips to help you organize your knitting patterns, keep track of inventory and create an archive of finished projects. Let's get crafty with Evernote!

## ONE Organize your patterns.

Scan in patterns, drop in PDFs, clip webpages, or snap a picture with your phone so your patterns are always with you. Create an Offline Notebook so you have access to your patterns, even without an Internet connection. Scanning and photographing patterns ensures that the paper patterns purchased at the local yarn shop won't get ruined.

## TWO Add your own notes to patterns.

Add notes to patterns about ways you've modified them for different projects (bigger, smaller, additions, subtractions).

## THREE Create a UFO (unfinished object) list.

This will help you keep track of those unfinished projects you have lying around the house!

## FOUR Keep track of your needles and hooks.

Add pictures and dimensions of all your needles and hooks to create an inventory list inside of Evernote.

## FIVE Create an inventory notebook.

Include information like weight, color, and amount of all the yarns stashed around the house. Add pictures (scanned or snapped with your phone) of the yarn, along with the label.

## SIX Don't forget miscellaneous supplies.

Scan in labels and other packaging information for your crafting and knitting supplies so you know what to purchase when you need refills.

## SEVEN Make a wish list.

Add yarn, needles, supplies, and accessories you hope to acquire.

## EIGHT Create an archive of finished projects.

Capture photos of finished projects being used by their new owner (include the project date and yarn used).

## NINE Capture inspiration.

Clip video links of techniques that you want to remember including yarn joins, stitch tips and new techniques.
